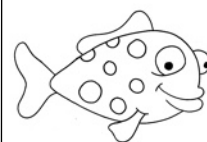

Let's tie up some midges this month..First a little clarification, many fly fishers hear the term "midge" and they just think : "little tiny flies". Well, we won't say that's incorrect, but we will say that there is more to the story. Here we're talking about "midge" as in Chironomid. While these are generally a relatively little fly, the term is not suggestive of size, but rather the type of bug. The midge flies might be tied as large as 8 or 10 (think Pyramid) or all the way down to size 20-24 if you can still those. Most often associated with mud bottom still-water environments like Crowley, Bridgeport, or Davis. they can also be found if streams. The fun part of tying midges is that you can let your imaging go wild and still come up with a fly that will probably catch fish. 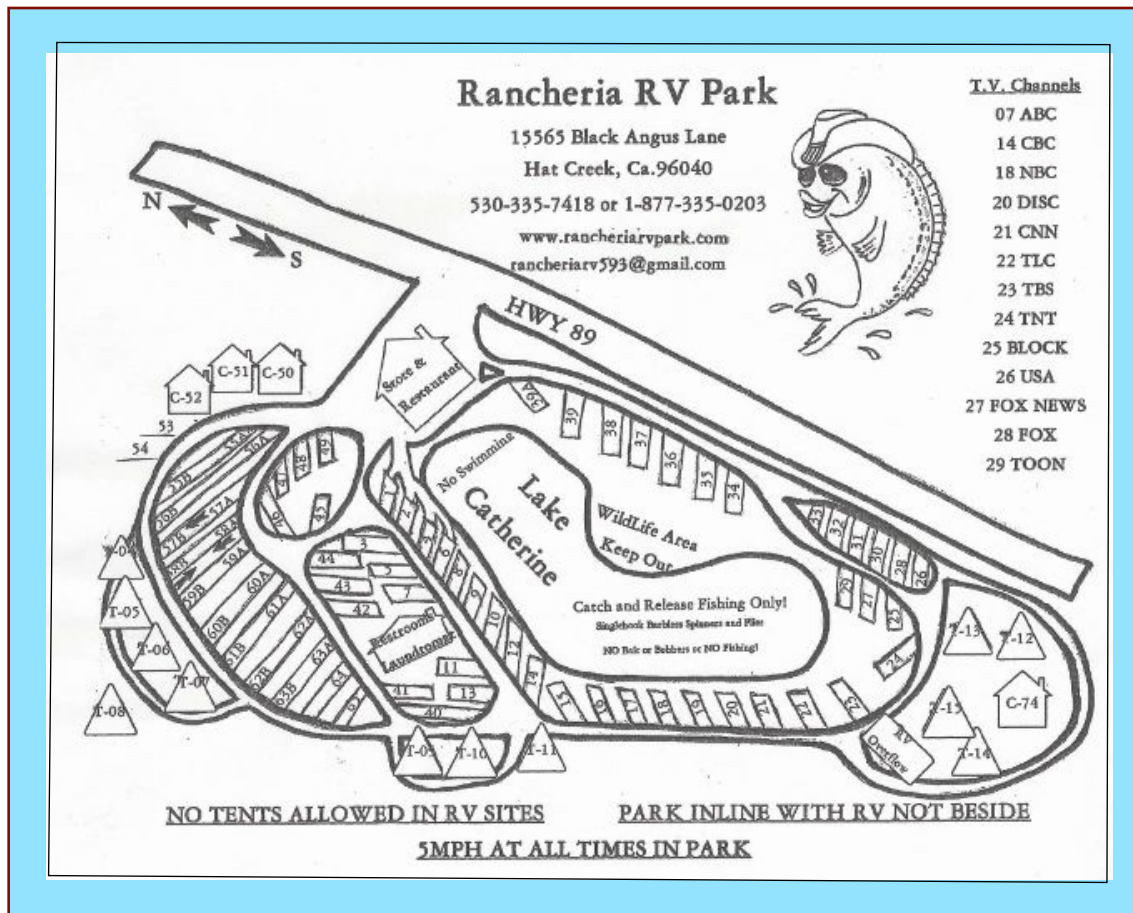

“Who Are These Guys Anyway” an irreverent look at the people who make up the membership of the Salinas Valley Fly Fishers



This month we take **Rick McCombs** to task. Since moving out of the area and up to Sutter Creek 5-6 years ago, we don't see him much at meeting anymore. So if some of the newer members don't recognize him from this photo taken on the Merced River you'll probably recognize him as Rick(ed.). Yep, that's him, he's the guy who sends you the newsletter every month. Rick has been the newsletter editor three different times since joining the club in the mid 80's. In total, he's put out the newsletter for something north of 25 years. He says: "that's why the damn thing never got any better". Along with being the

longest serving Editor in the club's history, Rick lays claim to another club record. Rick and his wife Carolyn lived in King City during most of his time in the club, and Rick figures that between monthly meetings, Board meetings and Fly Tying he's driven just shy of 100,000 miles trying to learn how to fly fish.

Rick grew up in Santa Cruz and met Carolyn in High School. They have been married for 52 years, and have two daughters and three grandchildren who live in Denver. After high school and a couple years at Cabrillo College, Rick joined the Air Force as an alternative to being drafted and ended up as an Air Traffic Controller. He served in Viet Nam in 1969-1970.

Following the 4 year stint in the military, he went back to college and finished up with a graduate degree in Psychology. Rick was the Director of the Hi-Desert Mental Health Center in Barstow for a few years then went into private practice as a Psychotherapist. In 1984, Carolyn and Rick moved to King City where she became a school principal and Rick continued private and later worked as a business and hospital Management Consultant.

Asked about fly fishing, Rick reports that he got his first fiberglass fly rod at a yard sale when he was about 16. "I got a few steelhead flies from Ernie (later of Ernie's Casting Pond) at the back of the United Cigar store on Pacific Ave. We'd "short line nymph" for Steelhead up in the San Lorenzo gorge and in Soquel Creek. In the Air Force, I stationed at George Air Force Base in the High Desert of Southern California. I discovered Deep Creek in the national forest. When he went to Viet Nam, he says that Carolyn sent him a fly tying kit. After returning, Rick and Carolyn stayed in the High Desert for several years. "I'd fish Deep Creek and make trips up to the Kern River and Big Bear, but I was self taught and my teacher wasn't very good. When we moved to King City, I heard about the Monterey Fly Casters". Rick says that's where he met Jay Murakoshi who invited him to a SVFF meeting. "I was excited to meet guys who really knew how to fly fish and were so willing to share. In addition to Murakoshi who taught me a ton about fly tying, there were great people like Bill and Caryl Dickens, Bob Montgomery, Ed Given and a bunch more". Within a few months, Rick was tricked into become club President. which was the first of three times that he would ultimately serve in that capacity, "like, they told it it was an honor to be club President, but I finally figured out that I was just "fresh meat".

When he was asked about "Favorites" he said: "I'd still have to say that the Merced River is my favorite stream, Rainbow's my favorite fish and the SVFF version of the Rio Grande King my favorite fly. As for memorable trips: "Three come to mind: Davis Lake with Al Miyamoto, Cory and Scott being guided by Jay Fair, a float trip on the Deschutes with Mick, Frank and Clyde Green, and a club trip to the Flaming Gorge that Jefferson arranged. Wow, what a beautiful place".

In closing he said: "I'd like to thank all the guys who became "fish'n buddies" and friends over the years. Lot's of laughs and memories served up with brown liquor in a dirty glass. More over to all the next generation of club fly fishers, Thanks for carrying on."

Fish Report from Wilson T.

Brendon and I camped at the Pit River Campground and spent the weekend fishing Hat Creek and Baum Lake with stops at the Pit and the Lower Sacramento. We went to Hat Creek to find ONE car in the parking lot. We spent 30 minutes or so in the riffles and I caught a small 'bow on a pink scud. We hit Baum Lake at 7:30 Saturday morning and I caught a 13" bow — again on a pink scud (size 16). The fishing was slow, but I managed to pick up 8 fish for the day. I broke off a big bow which took a #16 Hares Ear and lost a monster to a bent hook #16. Sunday morning found us back at Hat. Brendon caught a small bow on a #18 Caddis pupa and I had one grab in the riffles. We fished the Pit and Lower Sac on the way home with meager results. I caught a squaw fish on the Pit, and Brendon lost a nice bow on the Sac.
