December Fly of the Month:  
Cubby Chernobyl

- Chernobyl Recipe
- Hook: TMC 3xl heavy #6-8
- Thread: 6/0, Color to match
- Body: Ice Dub
- Overbody: 2mm Black and 2mm Orange Foam
- Wing: White Poly Yarn
- Legs: Rubber legs
- Tail: Krystal Flash



As noted by Steve Schalla on the website: ([www.flyfishingthesierra.com](http://www.flyfishingthesierra.com)), The Chubby Chernobyl often represents stoneflies and grasshoppers. The one pictured above is designed to emulate a Salmon Fly. The pattern can be tied in several colors and sizes to also represent crickets and Cicada. Black/tan is a good color for a grasshopper. Gold or tan for the Golden Stones, and Olive for the Skwala. Tied in sizes 6-12 to represent large stoneflies and grasshoppers. My personal favorite is the Yellow Sallies tied on a size 12 hook. Steve says that the original pattern came from the Chernobyl Ant which as designed in the 1980's and it morphed into the Chubby Chernobyl twenty years later. Idylwilde Flies of Portland, Or., modified the pattern by replacing the foam wings with fluffed Poly Yarn wings for better visibility and to provide the illusion of fluttering wings. This is an ideal pattern to use in a "Hopper Dropper" set-up. Most folks only think of this class of flies for big Terrestrial, but don't over look smaller versions as caddis or as general attractors. Refer to the Fly Fishing the Sierra web sight for more size and color combinations. ...ed.

### Loren Kitamura

At 88 years old, Loren can lay claim to being the club's oldest active member. Loren was born and raised in Salinas. He was middle child in a family with 6 sisters and one older brother. He attended Lincoln School as a kid, but in March of 1942, following the bombing of Pearl Harbor, his family was sent to the Salinas Assembly Center at the Rodeo Grounds. From there they boarded a train and were sent to camp #2 at the Poston Arizona "relocation center". Loren and his family remained in the camp for three years. Loren joined the National Guard during the Korean war, but later volunteered for the draft and served in Korea. He and Nellie were married a couple of years

after he returned from Korea. Loren and Nellie have three grown children: Rick, Ron and Julie. During his working days, Loren was a truck mechanic working for Bud Antle Inc., Foremost Dairies and Granite Rock. He retired in 1991, but then went to work as a truck driver for Reid Trucking and Meyers Equipment. He finally retired for good in 2006.

Loren says that he first got serious about fly fishing in the summer of 1970. He borrowed a couple fly rods from his cousin and fished for trout on the upper Trinity River above the lake. He took along some flies made in Japan that he bought at the store in Trinity Center. As he tells it, he bought some blue ones, some green, some red and pink and yellow too. "All my knowledge about fly fishing came from reading one book and I was immediately overwhelmed at all the different flies and methods used to catch trout".

Loren first joined the club around 1970, he doesn't remember exactly how he heard about it, but he remembers that Ed Given was the President and guys like Gene Sweitcher and Al Davis were in the club, and again he was immediately overwhelmed by their advanced skill in the sport. For Loren, trout fishing was initially his favorite. He liked fishing for trout in streams along with some Bluegill and small Black Bass in nearby ponds. Nowadays, however, his favorite fish is Striped Bass and his favorite place to fish is (you guessed it) the San Luis Reservoir and the forebay. Loren says: "I'm getting old and fishing from a boat is a lot easier way to fish than wading in a stream or fishing out of a float tube.

Loren shared: "I think that I have gained a lot from being in the club and I know I will gain a lot more by meeting old and new friends and sharing stories and learning new techniques on how to fly fish. The beauty of this sport is that you can never learn everything in a lifetime and you can continue to fly fish until a very old. I ought to know 'cause I'm an old fart myself, and I still want to go fishing whenever I get a chance."

For those who have had the opportunity to fish with Loren, you can no doubt appreciate his wry sense of humor, his warm enthusiasm for fly fishing and his friendly good nature, and if you're lucky maybe he'll treat you to a Trucker's Breakfast.. ..ed.

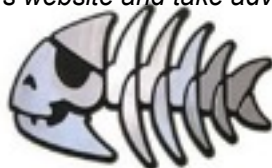
