March Fly of the Month:
The Zug Bug

Zug Bug Recipe

Hook: TMC 3761 #10-16
Thread: 6/0 Dr. Brown / Black
Weighted: Lead-free Wire
Body: Peacock Herl
Ribbing: Oval Silver Tinsel
Hackle: Brown Hen back
Wing-case: Wood Duck (clipped)
Tail: Peacock Sword



This old standby was developed by a guy from Pennsylvania named Cliff Zug around 1940. It became a popular fly in the Catskills, then worked its way west to Yellowstone and from there on all the way to the Sierras. The Zug Bug along with the Prince Nymph are among the most popular trout nymphs ever, second, today perhaps, only to the Copper John. The Zug Bug is probably a decent imitation of cased caddis and caddis larvae, but in the opinion of many fly tyers, doesn't look much like anything. What it does have going for it is the proven success of peacock, in this case both the herl and the sword and lots of contrast, which probably makes it more appropriately classed as an attractor pattern. It has a cigar shaped body. Utilizing lead-wire wraps on the middle of the shank helps to produce that shape. Unique to this fly is the wing-case which is only tied down at the front and gives the fly a caddis-like wing as a shell-back. In streams the fly should be fished near the bottom and the bead head version may help to get down in faster water. The Zug bug is also effective in stillwater, in smaller size as a general nymphs or in size 8-10 to suggest the dragon fly nymph. ed.

Merced River Regulation: In past years there were different regulations for the Merced in the park, below the park to Foresta bridge and below Foresta bridge. now all three sections are the same: *From the last Saturday in April through November 15, 5 trout daily bag limit, 10 trout in possession; and, from November 16 through the Friday preceding the last Saturday in April, 0 trout bag limit, artificial lures with barbless hooks only and trout must be released unharmed and not removed from the water*
