June Fly of the Month  
**King's River Caddis**

**King's River Caddis**

Hook: TMC 100 Size 12-18

Body: Tan/Brown dubbing

Wing: Clipped Turkey Wing

Hackle: Brown dry fly (one size smaller than hook size)

The King's River Caddis was developed by renowned fly tier "Buz" Buszek in the 1950's. He specifically developed the fly targeting fish on the Kings River below Pine Flat Reservoir. As opposed to the Elk Hair Caddis this is a better slow water pattern, that is rewarding to tie. ...ed.

Did you know that nearly all species of sea turtles are endangered? Every year, thousands of them perish trying to complete their migrations in the ocean below, with some having to swim as far as 1,250 miles to reach their nesting grounds. And as the reefs they rely on disappear and beach habitat is washed away, sea turtles are just one of many species struggling to survive.

## June is time for sunfish

When water temperatures reach 55-65 degrees, many of California's fish species prepare to spawn. This means fish move into shallow water and begin constructing nests to lay their eggs. The sunfish is one of these species. During the spawning period, sunfish become incredibly aggressive to anything that approaches their nest, allowing anglers who are fishing tube jigs, worms and crickets the opportunity to catch large numbers of these tasty gamefish. This highly aggressive nature, as well as the ability to live in warm, shallow, weedy waters has allowed the sunfish to thrive in urban waters and has made them popular with children and adults in just about every corner of the state. Grab those fishing rods and cast for sunfish this month.

### Heritage Trout Challenge Heats Up this Summer

Summer months bring opportunity to explore and discover California's remarkable native trout diversity. [The Heritage Trout Challenge](#) was designed to introduce anglers to this incredible species and spark interest in native trout conservation. Anglers are rewarded with a hat and a certificate for catching six native trout within their historic watersheds. While access to most of the trout species can be easy, backpacking can be a great way to escape the crowds and discover some truly wild places with unbelievable trout fishing. An Angler's Guide to the Heritage Trout Challenge provides detailed information on our different species and where to find them.


It happens every year. When the roadside cherry stands start opening up, it's time for Shad. You don't even have to put it on the calendar, Just look for the cherry stands and you'll know.

**Twin Lakes** have an Upper and Lower lake at about 7,000' elevation. The lakes have excellent fishing for both large Rainbows and Browns, with some Kokanee. Both lakes have held state records for a German Brown. the latest was for 26 lbs. 8 oz. out of Lower Twin. The best chances for flyfishers is by float tubing along the banks in the early morning or late afternoon/evening. The Kokanee will hit the surface for attractor drys. Lahontan cutthroats are currently being restored to the lake. Float tubing is good at both lakes, particularly around the inlet areas and the northern shorelines. Twin Lakes is only about 10 miles from Bridgeport Reservoir and close several small streams and creek that hold beautiful brook trout.
